VISIT OF POSTER HOUSE

On a lovely Friday night, two dozen members of l'Union Alsacienne of New York gathered at Poster House Museum in Chelsea. It was a delightful Spring evening, and we started with sharing a glass of wine, and reconnecting with old friends while welcoming members who had recently joined.

Poster House is dedicated to presenting the impact, culture, and design of posters, both as historical documents and methods of contemporary visual communication. Through temporary exhibitions, a growing permanent collection, and educational events, Poster House explores the enormous impact of posters on society and culture, and how they have been adapted to contemporary use. Founded in 2015, Poster House is still young yet it was the first poster museum in the United States.

We had the opportunity to visit as a group the exhibition: Puerto Rico in Print-The Posters of Lorenzo Homar, who was a pioneering printmaker, poster designer, calligrapher, painter, illustrator, caricaturist, and costume and theatrical set designer. Active from the 1950s through the 1990s, few equal his impact and influence as a teacher of poster design and printmaking in Latin America. This exhibition focused on his poster output over a thirty-year period during which time his work reflected the complex history of Puerto Rico.

It was a compelling reminder, for us coming from Alsace recently or through our ancestors, that immigration also leads to the making of memorable Art that participates in the fabric of this country.

His version of The Merveilleux has quickly become a must-have and Fred opened many more stores across France. In the past few years, Fred started the conquest of the American market, there are already three Merveilleux de Fred stores in New York!

Cheering over delicious finger foods, and marveling at the Halloween costumes that many kids – and quite a few adults – had selected to wear, a large group of about 50 members and friends of l'Union Alsacienne of New York spent a delightful evening. The highlight of the party was a dedicated workshop, where two professional pastry chefs facilitated the making of Merveilleux! THE BREDALA OF L'UNION ALSACIENNE: A SHARED TRADITION IN NEW YORK



This year, the Bredala preparation of L'Union Alsacienne, a cherished annual tradition, welcomed **Gisèle Bourcart**, mother of member **Capucine Bourcart**. Visiting New York to spend time with her family, Gisèle joined the team for a convivial day dedicated to baking bredala in anticipation of the Christmas meal—a beautiful way to keep the Alsatian spirit alive abroad. An Alsatian at heart, Gisèle makes her bredala every year starting at Advent, the four Sundays before Christmas. For this New York edition, she prepared **Schwowabretalas** (Swabian cookies) and raisin palets.

"The atmosphere was very joyful," she recalls. "Everyone arrived with their own dough and baking tools—there were as many varieties as there were participants! It was also very busy—we had to keep producing! Lively conversations flowed throughout the day without ever slowing the rhythm of baking."

Alongside **Andrea**, the president and baking coordinator, as well as **Liliane**, **Stéphanie and Muriel** and other enthusiastic participants, Gisèle found the experience to be much more than just a baking session: "It's a beautiful and delicious tradition, but also one of sharing, since we give bretalas to many people around us. It perfectly reflects the spirit of the Alsatian Christmas celebration in New York."

Baking bretalas in New York, she notes, is far from trivial: "We may be abroad, but we carry a piece of Alsace with us—and we share it in the most universal way: through food." Before leaving, Gisèle shared with enthusiasm: "I'll be back home soon to start making mine... But I would gladly return next year! The atmosphere was enough to lift anyone's spirits—it could cheer up even the most downhearted person!"

Monique Dubois-Inzinna — 90 ans de mémoire, de résistance et de destin cinématographique

Née en 1935 à Colmar, Monique Dubois-Inzinna traverse neuf décennies avec une vivacité d'esprit remarquable. Elle passe son enfance à Saverne, mais en 1940, la vie bascule : l'Alsace est annexée par l'Allemagne nazie. Son père, parisien et farouchement anti-nazi, refuse de vivre sous occupation. La famille quitte l'Alsace à contre-cœur, portant avec elle le sens profond de l'identité française, une identité que Monique n'abandonnera jamais. L'histoire de sa mère constitue un chapitre à part entière : une Allemande devenue résistante française, espionne infiltrée au commissariat allemand. Elle aide près de 200 familles juives à s'échapper vers l'Espagne. Après la guerre, elle refuse la médaille de la Liberté. Ce n'était pas de l'héroïsme, disait-elle. C'était simplement ce qu'il fallait faire. Une pianiste extraordinaire, une femme de courage discret, une figure qui a sans doute modelé le sens moral de Monique.

L'ENFANCE SOUS LES PROJECTEURS

À 6 ans seulement, Monique participe à un casting national. Elle est choisie parmi 3 000 candidates pour incarner la fille de Pierre Renoir dans La Loi du printemps (1942). Le tournage a lieu dans le sud de la France, à Dax, là même où sa mère espionnait l'occupant.

Le film marque profondément Monique, même si son père, veillant sur l'avenir scolaire de sa fille, freine sa carrière naissante. Plus tard, elle recevra même une proposition contractuelle d'Hollywood... mais son fiancé de l'époque refuse qu'elle s'y engage.



VIE ADULTE — PASSION, MIGRATIONS ET RÉSILIENCE

À 20 ans, elle épouse un étudiant en médecine. Elle le suit en Italie, y vit trois ans, puis en 1957 embarque pour l'Amérique: New Jersey, terre d'accueil, terre d'espoirs.

Elle s'installe à Fort Lee, ville mythique. Peu de gens le savent, mais avant Hollywood, Fort Lee était le cœur du cinéma américain. Les premiers studios, les premières caméras, les premiers plateaux : tout a commencé là. Pendant quelques années, Monique est mannequin à New York, photographie après photographie. Puis elle devient mère, Joseph en 1961, Danielle en 1963, avant de connaître 7 petits-enfants.

Elle divorce en 1972, reprenant son indépendance et ouvre une agence de voyage dans le New Jersey. Elle devient entrepreneure, puis arrête sa carrière pour aider sa fille à élever ses enfants. En 1998, elle se remarie, avec le même homme, puis divorce à nouveau en 2017, choisissant à 82 ans la liberté personnelle.

RETOUR AU CINÉMA ET RECONNAISSANCE LOCALE

Juste avant la pandémie, Monique participe à une nouvelle production cinématographique dirigée par Paul Sampson. Le film ne sera jamais finalisé, mais l'expérience est précieuse : c'est le retour à la caméra, à la scène, à l'énergie créative des plateaux.

Elle devient également Gouverneur et juge du Golden Door Film Festival à Jersey City, contribuant à récompenser des œuvres cinématographiques émergentes.



LA BOUCLE PARFAITE: FORT LEE, CINÉMA, HÉRITAGE

Et aujourd'hui...le destin s'amuse.

Son premier film, La Loi du printemps, celui qui a commencé toute son histoire, sera projeté au Barrymore Film Center à Fort Lee ce printemps, à quelques rues de chez elle, dans la ville où elle vit depuis plus de six décennies.

Imaginez le symbole : la petite fille alsacienne qui jouait face à Pierre Renoir devient la femme honorée sur grand écran dans la ville américaine qui fut le berceau du cinéma mondial.

HONORING THE LEGACY OF ANDRÉ SOLTNER

Memorial Gathering – April 5th, New York

On April 5th, the culinary world, friends, and longtime admirers gathered in New York to celebrate the life and extraordinary legacy of André Soltner, the iconic Alsatian chef of the legendary restaurant Lutèce. A true ambassador of Alsace and a long-standing member of L'Union Alsacienne of New York, Soltner profoundly shaped French gastronomy in America and inspired generations of chefs.

Representing L'Union Alsacienne de New York, Liliane Rubin, our Vice President, Jim Rubin, our Trustee, and Francis Dubois, our Treasurer and former President, attended this deeply emotional memorial. The atmosphere was filled with respect, affection, and gratitude for the man who elevated French cuisine to new heights while remaining humble, generous, and closely connected to his Alsatian roots.
